MUSIC NOTES AUGUST 2025

Summer is a time to refresh, relax, spend time doing things that perhaps you do not have time for during the "school year". Yes, I still live my life based on the "school year". All those years of being a student and then a teacher leave a permanent mark! One of the things that I truly enjoy doing is planning the music that I will play or that the choir will sing in worship in the upcoming months. I like to research the scriptures and learn which hymn texts/tunes match when I prepare music for each Sunday. One reliable source that I use is hymnargy.org which recommends music for specific scripture readings. I am grateful that Pastor Jim follows The Lectionary of the liturgical calendar so that I have advanced notice of the readings for each Sunday and have a pretty good idea of what he might choose to preach on for that day. This is truly helpful when planning choral anthems because it takes a few weeks of our short rehearsals together to learn the music.


I was searching for music suggestions that would enhance our worship in the months of September and October 2025 when I got sidetracked by being curious about the composer of "Will The Circle Be Unbroken" - that great gospel hymn, which was recommended for September 28th's reading of Luke 16:19-31. It is all too easy to go down rabbit holes when researching! Anyway, I learned that the composer was Charles H. Gabriel (1856-1932). I knew I had heard that name before so I kept on digging. Sure enough, he has written some of the greatest gospel songs: His Eye Is On The Sparrow (a personal fave of mine); Higher Ground; Will The Circle Be Unbroken; Send The Light to name a few.

It turns out that he has written between 7,000-8,000 hymn tunes and texts and was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 1982. As is common with composers who are very prolific, he had several pseudonyms that he used in addition to writing under his given name: C.D. Emerson; Charlotte G. Homer; S.B. Jackson; A.W. Lawrence; Jennie Ree.

What really caught my attention was a picture of him from 1885 in the Des Moines Register. I am an Iowa girl so when I see the Des Moines Register...it registers with me! He grew up on an Iowa farm and started writing hymn texts and tunes as a young man in his teens. His father led singing schools in their home and Charles developed an interest in music. He taught himself to play the family's reed organ. Eventually, he followed in his father's footsteps and started to travel and lead his own "shape-note singing schools" in various locations around the age of 17. Throughout his life, he served churches and wrote music for revivals and camp meetings and published numerous songbooks, many of which were intended for use in Sunday School. He died in Hollywood, California in 1932. Prior to his death, he had written an autobiography entitled Sixty Years of Gospel Song (Chicago, IL Hope Publishing).

I had always assumed that the composer/author of *His Eye Is On The Sparrow* was a black man. My favorite gospel song was actually written by this white Iowa farm boy! Amazing...and a lesson to not just assume anything, but to dig deep and learn.
