In some ways the atheist does a better job believing that they don’t believe than we do believing that we do believe. We can learn something from the atheist. We can learn to be more passionate about our faith and what we believe. Penn Jillette got it right. “How much do you have to hate somebody to believe that everlasting life is possible and not tell them that?”

Kenda Dean, also an atheist, observed that the problem doesn’t seem to be that churches are teaching badly, but that they’re doing an exceedingly good job teaching what they really believe; namely, that Christianity is not a big deal, that God requires little, and the church is a helpful social institution filled with people focused primarily on “folks like us.”

Wow...just think...to believe with the passion and conviction of an atheist.

## MUSIC NOTES

Music is a powerful medium to relay information. We remember the words of musical pieces far more readily than the spoken word. We sing hymns in our worship services to help the message of the Gospel become a part of our daily lives. You most likely have heard the term “you are preaching to the choir.” That is because the choir already knows the importance of singing! Our choir is a small but very dedicated group of people who come out to rehearse every Wednesday night (yes, even in these dark and cold months!) and sing every Sunday morning in our worship services. I hope that you appreciate the gift they continually give to the congregation each week - a sung version of the Gospel message that is preached by Pastor Jim. In selecting our choral anthems, Peter and I try to match the scriptural messages with the texts of the music.

On February first the choir will be singing three African American spirituals: *Somebody's Knockin' At Your Door*; *Go Down, Moses* and *We Shall Overcome*. *Go Down, Moses* was effectively banned by slave owners who recognized it as a coded message for escape, using the biblical story of liberation to inspire enslaved people to flee to freedom, with Harriet Tubman famously using it as a signal song on the Underground Railroad. Slaveholders outlawed its singing due to its powerful anti-slavery and freedom-promoting messages, making it a dangerous song for enslaved people to share openly. *Somebody's Knockin' At Your Door* encourages us to listen to that still small voice in our hearts and to follow the call of God.

On February eighth, the choir will be singing *Over Desert, Hill and Valley*, which is an Epiphany text. The Gospel reading for this day (Matthew 5:13-20) is about our calling to be “salt of the earth” and “letting our light shine in the world”, being disciples of Jesus and following God’s commandments. Part of the text of our anthem for this day reads: “When we’ve seen Christ’s star of promise shining through earth’s night, when we’ve followed till we’ve found Him, Love’s eternal Light, paths of sin no more allure us from that hallowed day; souls who once have seen their Savior, walk His holy way. We will walk His holy way.”

Our choral anthem on February fifteenth (Transfiguration Sunday) is *Your Word, Oh Lord*. Transfiguration is a hard concept to grasp. This is when God appeared as a bright light/cloud overshadowing them and **spoke** to Jesus, Peter, James and John on a mountaintop, saying “This is my Son whom I dearly love. I am very pleased with him. Listen to him!” All these centuries later, we Christians are called to “listen to him” too by reading the scriptures and following the unending wisdom of God.

The choir will be singing the American folk hymn *Lonesome Valley* on the first Sunday of Lent. This song is rooted in both African American spirituals and Appalachian folk traditions and deals with themes of personal burdens and faith. The first verse focuses on Jesus walking alone, presumably to the cross. But the next two verses are all about us. In the anthem we will be singing, Gilbert Martin’s text of verse two highlights the importance of the personal journey we all must make throughout our lives:

*I must walk my lonesome valley,  
I have to walk it for myself;  
Nobody else can walk it for me.  
I have to walk it for myself.*

This is not to say that we walk alone! God is always with us guiding our journey and it is our faith and hope that keep us following the way of love and compassion. Courage is needed to accept whatever the valley holds for me while trusting my path will help me to grow and evolve.


